The Oak and Pine

It is easy to forget, my brothers, that we have pledged ourselves to the ideals of the Order of the Arrow for life.

As Allowat Sakima says in the Ordeal ceremony, 'membership in our Order is given, not only for what you have done but for what you are expected to do in the future, for your journey is just beginning.' Thus, our beliefs are not mere words we recite in the obligation, but they are a way of life dedicated to cheerful service to others.

Let us hearken back to the night of your Pre-Ordeal Ceremony and recall the challenges of the Ordeal. I am certain you have forgotten how you stood in front of the four principle characters at your pre-ordeal ceremony--a little nervous, a little excited: perhaps you had difficulty concentrating on the words spoken.

Nutiket, the Guard, asked you to think back on your scouting career and urged you to build upon the fire of cheerfulness within you. He challenged you to, "eat nothing but the scant food you will be given": you submitted yourself to the test of self denial. As a symbol of cheerfulness, Nutiket flexed a bow above his head, saying "test yourselves, and so discover that

cheerful heart is as lively as this bow-wood, under hardship." I now ask you, are you always cheerful?

Next, Metu, the Medicine Man, bid you to strictly keep a pledge of silence, for 'hours spent in thoughtful silence help us make the right decisions more than days and days of talking'; he further explained that the Order would admit only those who are, "determined to fulfill its obligations out of love for one another." Metu then produced a bowstring and told you that the pledge of silence would 'bind you each to every other'; you and the other candidates were bound in brotherhood. Are you still loyal in brotherhood? Then, Allowat Sakima, the Mighty Chief, exhorted you to "spend the day in arduous labor working gladly...

A Message from the Vice Chief...

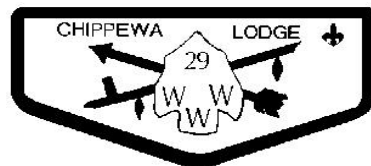

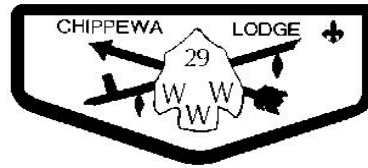
On the Chippy Trail

COMMITTEES

With all the talk about becoming active, here is a list and description ' of the committees that you can take part in.

CAMP PROMOTIONS

The camp promotions committee operates during the months of OCT. thru MAY. The purpose of this committee is to promote camping. The main focus is on our council camps but promotional material also includes other councils' camps and state parks. You can participate by visiting a Troop in your chapter and showing the LLSR video and passing out promotional information.

UNIT ELECTIONS

The Unit Elections committee operates during the months of JAN. thru MAR. The purpose of this committee is to preside over O-A elections. It is important to have an election in every troop. Without Unit Elections our lodge will not exist. You can participate by visiting a Troop in your chapter and conducting an O-A election.

ELANGOMAT

The Elangomat committee operates year round, but mostly at the spring and fall conclaves. The purpose of this committee is to lead clan through their ordeal and keep their clans informed of chapter and lodge events. You can participate by being an Elangomat at an ordeal (it is a good way to review for your brotherhood questionnaire).

CEREMONIES

The Ceremonies committee operates year round but the main performances are at the spring and fall conclaves. The main purpose of this committee is to perform the O-A Induction ceremonies. There is also competition at section conclaves and the National Order of the Arrow Conference (NOAC). You can participate by learning one of the parts (this committee is, in my opinion, the most fun). Recognition, Brotherhood, Vigil, Publications and Special Committees take place at the Lodge level and the committee does most of the work. Sometimes the committee chairman calls special meetings which require at least one member from each chapter for representation on the committee. Your chapter chief will let you know if you will be needed to serve on one of these committees. And now the most important information in the article if you want to become active and participate on a committee you MUST attend your chapter meetings.

Brotherhood Study Guide

With re-chartering coming up it is time for you to seal your membership in the Order by getting your brotherhood. To help you achieve Brotherhood use this study guide. For even more information read your Order of the Arrow handbook.

On the Trail to Brotherhood

Your completion of the Ordeal sets you on the next part of your "long and toilsome journey": at least ten months of active preparation for sealing your membership in the Brotherhood ceremony. The Ordeal has introduced you to the mysteries of the Arrow. Now, during your service as an Ordeal member, you have ample opportunity to increase your knowledge of the Arrow and to make it work for you. This reading provides all the basic information you will need during this important time. Your brothers in the Order stand ready to help also, and you should take advantage of their support whenever possible.

The Challenges of Brotherhood Membership

You must meet five challenges before you can enter the Circle of the Brotherhood. The first of these you should meet now. The next three require steady effort over a period of many months. The last challenge you must meet after you are satisfied that you are meeting the first four.

1. Memorize the signs of Arrow membership. Memorize of the Obligation of the Sakima. Also, memorize the Order of the Arrow Official Song, the Admonition, the sign of Ordeal membership, and this Arrow handclasp.

2. Advance in your understanding of the Ordeal. Gain a through understanding of the Ordeal through which you have passed.

3. Serve your unit. Retain your registration in Scouting. During a period of at least ten months, strive to fulfill your Obligation by continuing and expanding your service to your own troop, crew, or post.

4. Plan for service in your lodge. Retain your registration in your Order of the Arrow lodge and keep your dues paid. Be aware that acceptance of Brotherhood membership involves a pledge of service to the lodge. Develop a concrete idea of how you plan to fulfill this pledge.

5. Review your progress. When you earnestly feel that you have met the four challenges above, write a letter to your lodge secretary this pledge.

Explain what you think the Obligation means.

Describe how you have been fulfilling this Obligation in your troop or post and in your daily life, and how you have used your understanding of the Ordeal to aid in this service.

Describe your specific plans for giving service in the lodge program. Include with this letter your advance registration and fees for the next Brotherhood ceremony according to the instructions giving by the Lodge.

Purpose of Brotherhood Membership

From the inception of the Order in 1915; it was intended that all members should be of the same rank or standing. Brotherhood membership does not carry with it any degree of rank, status, or special privilege within the lodge. It is not to be thought of as a separate honor in the same sense as the Vigil Honor. Except for making the necessary arrangements for Brotherhood ceremonies, it is not necessary for Brotherhood members to meet as a separate group. Social and service activities are not held for Brotherhood members apart from other members of the lodge. The Brotherhood is an opportunity for members to evaluate their past contributions to Scouting and the lodge and to reaffirm their belief in the high purpose of the Order. The ceremony is intended as a source of inspiration, motivating its members to render even greater service to Scouting. ←

and thus be faithful to the high ideals and purpose of the order of the arrow.' You were then offered an opportunity to turn back and decline the ordeal; yet you accepted the challenge by testing the bow. Allowat Sakima had united the bow of cheerfulness and the bow-string of brotherhood for the purpose of service, and he drew an arrow from his quiver, just as you were selected from your fellow scouts to be a member of the order of the arrow. He concluded with the wise "He who follows such a path in unwavering cheerful service will be seen by many others and, by inspiration, lead them." Are you dedicated to the service of others?

Finally, Kithkinet, the Guide, nocked the arrow, aimed high, and loosed it upon a

loftly journey. The flight of the arrow is like the path of the leader who dedicates himself to selfless service to others. Kithkinet then challenged you to sleep alone that night, and he warned you, "All your strength will be required when you face the isolation, which a leader often faces." You see, Kithkinet was urging you to become a true leader in the "brighter, greater beauty in a life of cheerful service." Are you such a leader?

These, my brothers, are the tests of the Ordeal. And so are they the tests of life, for the Ordeal does not last just one week-end, but it lasts for the rest of our days. We must be ever resolute in the lofty ideals of our Order. Through the test of the Ordeal--silence, self-denial, arduous labor, and isolation--we are exposed to the ideals of the Order: Brotherhood, Cheerfulness, Service, and Leadership. You will notice that the ideals of the Order of the Arrow are little more than an extension of the Scout Oath and Law.

My Brothers, I challenge you: Strive to be loyal, loving, and a brother to all. Be unwavering in cheerfulness, "even in the midst of irksome tasks and weighty responsibilities", as we say in the obligation. Give of yourself to serve your fellow man; "ease the burdens from the shoulders of your fellow scouts" says Allowat Sakima in the Ordeal ceremony. Prove yourself to be a true leader in all actions and words and in your relationships with all people. These ideals are our common bond, my.....

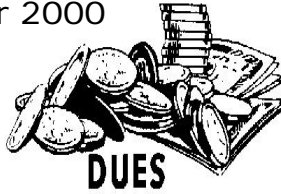
